### Aboriginal Interests and Nature Conservation Policy

DRAFT NCC Aboriginal Interests and Nature Conservation Policy

#### ABORIGINAL INTERESTS AND NATURE CONSERVATION

##### 1.0. PREAMBLE

1.1 The Nature Conservation Council of NSW (NCC) first developed a comprehensive policy in relation to Aboriginal interests at a Special Conference in 1988. It was subsequently amended at the 1993, 1998, and 2005 Annual Conferences. This policy updates and replaces all previous policy statements on Aboriginal Interests and Nature Conservation. An important purpose of the policy is to assist NCC and its member groups to engage in open and constructive dialogue with Aboriginal people on the future of the nature conservation lands of NSW. This policy recognises that Aboriginal people need land to meet their economic, social, cultural and spiritual needs and that an important part of NCC's mission is to protect the nature conservation values of lands throughout NSW, ideally in well-managed and adequately funded public reserves secured under the provisions of the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Act. There is much common ground, and also some potential conflict, in the aspirations of Aboriginal interests and nature conservation interests. NCC seeks an honest and mutually respectful relationship with Aboriginal people that builds on shared values and aims, but does not deny differences where they exist. It is hoped that this policy statement will assist NCC in building good relationships with Aboriginal communities and help to deliver outcomes that benefit Aboriginal interests while ensuring the conservation of nature, the protection of the environment, and the attainment of an ecologically sustainable society. Regardless of specific disputes and their outcomes, NCC will uphold this policy statement and will work towards its implementation in a manner that values both the conservation of nature and the Aboriginal cultures of NSW.

##### 2.0 INTERPRETATION AND IMPLEMENTATION

2.1 This policy is to be interpreted and implemented in accordance with NCC's constitutional aims and objects and with NCC's other relevant policies. In this policy the term 'lands' includes 'waters'; the term 'national parks' includes other categories of protected area of similar standing;

### 3.0 GUIDING STATEMENTS ON ABORIGINAL RIGHTS TO LAND

- 3.1 Aboriginal people have the right to maintain their communities and their cultures.
- 3.2 Aboriginal communities are the original occupiers, custodians and stewards of the land.
- 3.3 Aboriginal communities are now disadvantaged, in part because the land was taken from them.
- 3.4 Aboriginal communities have special rights to land based on their occupation since time immemorial.
- 3.5 It is right that land be returned to Aboriginal communities.
- 3.6 Aboriginal communities have deep spiritual relationships with their traditional lands or 'country'.
- 3.7 Aboriginal communities have rights and responsibilities to maintain their cultural practices on country.
- 3.8 Aboriginal communities have knowledge and cultural practices and values that can assist in the conservation of nature and the protection of the environment.

### 4.0 GUIDING STATEMENTS ON NATURE CONSERVATION

- 4.1 While this policy largely addresses the significance of land to different groups in human society, NCC recognises that land supports geodiversity and biodiversity with values that are intrinsic and independent of their worth to any human group.
- 4.2 The primary constitutional aims of the NCC are the conservation of nature, the protection of the environment, and the attainment of an ecologically sustainable society, and NCC will continue to work towards the realisation of these aims.
- 4.3 The public system of national parks, held in perpetuity under the provisions of the National Parks and Wildlife Act, and managed by an expert and well-funded nature conservation authority, is a cornerstone of nature conservation in NSW and NCC will continue to work for its protection, expansion and enhancement.
- 4.4 NCC will continue to work towards the establishment and good management of a comprehensive, adequate and representative system of national parks reflecting the full range of IUCN categories.
- 4.5 NCC will continue to work for the conservation of natural ecosystems and biodiversity, and for ecologically sustainable management, on all lands throughout NSW regardless of tenure and ownership.
- 4.6 NCC will continue to support wilderness reservation and management under the NSW Wilderness Act, and will work to protect wilderness areas from development and inappropriate uses.

### 5.0 NCC WILL WORK WITH ABORIGINAL INTERESTS TO ACHIEVE COMMON AIMS

- 5.1 NCC expresses its appreciation for the vital and important role that Aboriginal Australians have played in preserving the natural heritage of NSW and its respect for their cultural links to 'country'.
- 5.2 NCC believes Aboriginal lands can form a vital part of the protected area system. These 'indigenous protected areas' can be achieved through Aboriginal-owned lands managed to maintain their nature conservation values under arrangements secured by statutory arrangements and/or legal instruments.
- 5.3 NCC advocates support, funding and other resources for the management of Aboriginal lands with nature conservation values in order to achieve high quality indigenous protected areas.
- 5.4 NCC will seek the co-operation of Aboriginal communities in applying to any lands with significant nature conservation values which may be sought, claimed, controlled or owned by them - under whatever process or legal regime - appropriate policies for nature conservation and the protection of the environment, including policies on fire management.
- 5.5 Where NCC shares a common interest with an Aboriginal community in the management of their lands, NCC may assist that community to source funding for that purpose.
- 5.6 Where vacant crown land claimed by Aboriginal interests has nature conservation values, NCC may support such claims on the basis that the lands are held as Aboriginal-owned conservation reserves under joint management as provided under the Aboriginal Land Rights Act and the National Parks and Wildlife Act; alternatively, NCC may support the claim subject to conditions as may be applied under the NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act to protect those values, while allowing community uses of an appropriate kind and scale.
- 5.7 NCC may support Aboriginal co-management of national parks and other protected areas, and other forms of participation in the management of such lands. These arrangements can help to re-establish Aboriginal traditional links with country while maintaining national park tenure and public ownership of the land.
- 5.8 Where an area of existing national park land is of great cultural or spiritual significance to a local Aboriginal community, NCC may support the vesting of title in the land in that community, under terms which will maintain its national park status, and protect the natural and cultural values of the land, in perpetuity [Part 4A National Parks and Wildlife Act].
- 5.9 NCC will collaborate with Aboriginal interests to seek grant funding for joint research and other purposes consistent with NCC's aims and objects.
- 5.10 NCC will support strategies for the management of Aboriginal lands in ecologically sustainable ways.
- 5.11 NCC will support skill sharing for sustainable land management.
- 5.12 NCC will support significant Aboriginal roles and Aboriginal employment in environmental management.
- 5.13 NCC will support the appointment of adequately resourced Aboriginal representatives to government advisory councils and committees concerned with natural resources and the environment. NCC supports additional and more culturally appropriate ways for government to engage Aboriginal opinion and acknowledge Aboriginal interests in the management of natural resources and the environment.
- 5.14 NCC will take into account and apply, as appropriate to conditions in NSW, relevant international policies including the policies of the World Conservation Union (IUCN) on protection of indigenous interests, management of protected areas, and conservation of biodiversity.

## 6.0 NCC WILL WORK WITH ABORIGINAL INTERESTS TO RESOLVE DIFFERENCES

6.1 Certain lands in NSW are of particular interest to both NCC and to Aboriginal communities. These include public lands which may be subject to native title claims, vacant crown lands which may be subject to claims under the Aboriginal Land Rights Act, and some national park lands of special cultural significance for which transfer of title with lease-back arrangements may be sought. Aboriginal rights over public lands may also be granted via regional indigenous agreements concluded by government with Aboriginal communities.

6.2 NCC and Aboriginal interests may not always agree on the best use of lands subject to Aboriginal claims and agreements. NCC believes that an open and honest approach which addresses both areas of agreement and of difference, and which allows an ongoing dialogue, offers the best way forward. NCC will make itself available and support negotiations to resolve conflicts.

6.3 Unless NCC's interests are significantly affected it will generally not take a position on native title claims, land rights claims, or indigenous regional agreement processes, or question the outcomes.

6.4 Where the granting of Aboriginal claims on public lands with significant nature conservation values is likely to lead to a serious diminution of those values, such claims will not be supported by NCC, and may give rise to objections; this may also be the case where the lands are likely to be on-sold, leased, or otherwise alienated to non-Aboriginal interests.

6.5 NCC is concerned that the NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act allows for the alienation of Aboriginal lands and hopes that this does not lead to a new era of dispossession. NCC would like to see Aboriginal-owned lands held in perpetuity in a secure form of community title. NCC nevertheless recognises that this is a matter for Aboriginal communities to decide, subject to law, and accepts that Aboriginal people must participate on an equal basis in contemporary society, including the manner in which they hold and deal with their lands.

6.6 NCC supports consistent and non-discriminatory planning rules in NSW which protect the environmental values of the land. Land uses and development approvals should be decided on the basis of good planning and not influenced by the ownership of the land.

6.7 NCC accepts that some areas of national park land of great cultural or spiritual significance to local Aboriginal communities, may be transferred from public ownership to Aboriginal community ownership, subject to statutory lease-back and joint management arrangements which continue the national park status of the land in perpetuity [Part 4A National Parks and Wildlife Act]. NCC will seek to ensure that uncertainties about the long term status and protection of national park lands under Part 4A are addressed. Similarly, NCC will seek to ensure that national park lands held under Part 4A are not exposed to added financial burdens as may detract from their good management or their capacity to conserve the nature conservation values of the land.

6.8 NCC does not accept that national park lands should be made available to compensate Aboriginal interests for historical wrongs, or for economic purposes. NCC believes the best way to provide compensation to Aboriginal communities for the past loss of their lands, and to improve their economic position, is for substantial funding to be made available to them for land acquisition, and for other forms of investment, and to help secure improvements in their levels of health, education and vocational training. NCC supports the reinstatement to Aboriginal interests of a share in NSW land tax receipts expressly for these purposes.

6.9 NCC will seek the co-operation of Aboriginal owners in applying NCC policies for the protection of biodiversity and the environment to their lands.

6.10 NCC will promote considered approaches to bushfire management across the landscape, based on the best interests of nature conservation, consultation with any affected Aboriginal landowners, and the best available expert knowledge.

6.11 NCC will seek the co-operation of Aboriginal communities in ensuring that hunting and gathering activities in national parks are carried out in accordance with formally adopted plans of management made under the relevant legislation. NCC hopes that Aboriginal hunting and gathering in NSW national parks will be limited to essential cultural purposes; NCC does not support hunting and gathering in national parks for economic or other purposes.

6.12 NCC recognises that wilderness areas contribute significantly to nature conservation and the protection of the environment in NSW. NCC will seek to keep wilderness areas free of encroachments, dwellings and other structures, roads, tracks and other works in accordance with the provisions of the NSW Wilderness Act. NCC also recognises that 'wilderness' is a concept that is seen by some people as not fitting well with the Aboriginal concept of 'country'. However, NCC believes there is much scope for cooperation with Aboriginal groups in managing and caring for wilderness areas and will work towards finding common ground.

## 7.0 RESPECT FOR ABORIGINAL PERSPECTIVES

7.1 NCC will seek to co-operate with all Aboriginal interests in order to achieve common aims and resolve differences.

7.2 NCC will always seek to deal with differences with Aboriginal interests in a manner that maintains mutual respect.

7.3 NCC will listen to individual and collective Aboriginal viewpoints.

7.4 NCC will respect Aboriginal decision-making processes including decisions about who is a traditional owner and who can speak for place and for people.

7.5 NCC will respect Aboriginal sensitivities and practices concerning the holding and use of Aboriginal cultural knowledge.

7.6 NCC recognises the rights and responsibilities of Aboriginal communities to participate in the development and implementation of policies and strategies for the management of lands and natural and cultural resources in which those communities have an interest.

7.7 NCC will promote links, alliances and contacts between conservationists and Aboriginal people at local, regional and state levels to protect the environment and Aboriginal cultural heritage and for other common goals.

7.8 NCC will encourage its member societies to become more involved with local Aboriginal groups.

7.9 NCC will support and encourage Aboriginal people who advocate the management of communal land for conservation.

7.10 NCC will encourage member societies to invite Aboriginal people to join their organisations.

7.11 NCC will welcome as members Aboriginal non-government organisations which subscribe to NCC's constitutional aims and objects.

Amendments to the Constitution of the Nature Conservation Council of NSW Inc.

Submitted by the NCC Executive

**1. Removal of clause 12(b) relating to NCC's Ecofriends program.**

12 (b) Any person may subscribe to "Ecofriends" (Friends of the Nature Conservation Council) and shall be entitled to be known as "an Ecofriend" of the Council for the year or years for which the subscription is made".

**MOTION:** That clause 12(b) be removed from the constitution.

**2. Amendment of clause 13(a) relating to annual conference period.**

13. (a) The Conference shall be the supreme governing body of the Council and an Annual Conference shall be held in September or October of each year.

**MOTION:** That clause 13(a) be amended to remove the words "September or October" and insert the words "September, October or November" in their place.

**3. Removal of clause 19 relating to TRUSTEES and amendment of clause 4 relating to POWERS in order to give NCC the power to hold and deal with property in its own right.**

**POWERS**

4. The Council shall have the power to:

- (a) Purchase, acquire and receive any real or personal property which shall be held on behalf of the Council by the trustees and sell, transfer or demise and otherwise deal with any real or personal property of the Council.
- (b) Collect funds, and solicit, receive, enlist and accept subscriptions, donations, bequests and other financial aid from any person, trust corporation, firm, instrumentality or Government or any other body.
- (c) Raise and borrow money and secure repayment of money borrowed or the repayment of any debt or liability of the Council by any lawful means

**TRUSTEES**

19. There shall be four Trustees of the Council. The Trustees shall be appointed by the Executive. All the real and personal property of the Council held now or hereafter acquired (other than cash which shall be under the control of the Secretary) shall be vested in the Trustees to be dealt with by them as the Executive shall from time to time direct by resolution. The Trustees shall hold office until death or resignation or until the attainment of seventy years of age whereafter the appointment shall be reviewed annually or until removed from office by a resolution of the Executive who may for any reason which may seem sufficient to a majority of

them present and noting at any meeting remove any Trustee or Trustees from the office of Trustee. If by reason of any such death, resignation or removal, it shall appear necessary to the Executive that a new Trustee or Trustees shall be appointed or if the Executive shall deem it expedient to appoint an additional Trustee or additional Trustees the Executive shall by resolution nominate the person or persons to be appointed new Trustee or Trustees. For the purpose of giving effect to such nomination the Chairperson of the Executive is hereby nominated as the person to appoint new Trustees of the Council within the meaning of section 6 of the Trustee Act and s/he shall by Deed duly appoint the person so nominated by the Committee as the new Trustee or Trustees of the Council and the provisions of the Trustee Act 1925-1942 New South Wales shall apply to any such appointment.

**MOTION:**

(a) That clause 19 relating to TRUSTEES be removed from the constitution; and

(b) That clause 4 relating to POWERS be amended by removing all words contained in the clause and inserting the following in their place:

In furtherance of its Objects the Council shall, subject to this Constitution, have and exercise all powers and functions which in the opinion of the Executive are necessary or desirable including, but not limited, to the following:

(a) To purchase, take on lease or in exchange, hire and otherwise acquire any real or personal property, and any right or privilege, which may be used, in connection with any of the Objects of the Council and, in furtherance of those Objects, to manage, develop, improve, invest, exchange, lease, dispose of, assign, entrust to trustees, turn to account, or otherwise deal with any such property, right or privilege;

(b) To enter into any negotiations or arrangements with, or co-operate with or support in any way, any person, or any association or organisation whether incorporated or not;

(d) To enter into any negotiations or arrangements or co-operate with in any way, any government agency or authority, municipal, local or otherwise;

(e) To appoint, employ, remove or suspend staff, workers and other persons;

(f) To undertake, contribute to, subsidise or take part in any works, demolitions and any other activities affecting buildings, structures, grounds and works;

(g) To borrow or raise or secure the payment of money and to secure the same or the repayment or performance of any debt, liability, contract, guarantee or other engagement incurred or to be incurred by the Council in any way, and to purchase, redeem or pay off any such securities;

(h) To make, draw, accept, endorse, discount, execute and issue cheques, promissory notes, bills of exchange and other negotiable or transferable instruments;

(i) To take or hold mortgages, debentures, liens and charges to secure payment of the purchase price or any unpaid balance of the purchase price, or any part of the Council's property of whatever kind sold by the Council or any money due to the Council from purchasers and others;

(j) To make any gift of money or any other property either wholly beneficially or subject to any trust or any condition.



(k) to collect and receive money by voluntary contributions, subscriptions, donations, grants, sale of goods or property, and legacies.

(l) To manage the money of the Council and to invest such money in fixed or other deposit in any bank, or in notes, stocks, shares, debentures or securities of, or advances to, any company whether public or private, or in any other securities.

(m) In furtherance of the Objects to lend money to persons, organisations, associations, firms or companies being members or not, and on such terms, as the Executive may consider appropriate.

(n) To do all such acts, deeds, matters and things and to carry on such activities, and to enter into and make such agreements and arrangements as the Executive considers may further the Objects of the Council or any of them.

(o) To do all such acts, deeds, matters and things and to carry on such activities, and to enter into and make such agreements as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the Objects of the Council.

## Climate Change

Submitted by Robertson Environment Protection Society Inc. (REPS)

### **MOTION**

That the NCC call upon the Australian Government to implement the following climate action measures within the next Parliamentary term:

1. Introduce a non-partisan executive process to deal with climate change as a national emergency,
2. Ratify the existing Kyoto Protocol and co-operate internationally to develop new emission targets,
3. Select a national cap that would help limit global temperature rise to 2°C beyond that of 1990,
4. Regulate emissions by such measures as carbon taxation, equitable carbon trading and rationing,
5. Maintain carbon sinks by ecologically sustainable reforestation and nationwide biodiversity corridors,
6. Develop renewable energy and make the technology available to nearby countries at low cost,
7. Mandate energy and water-efficiency practices by governments, businesses and households,
8. Reduce dependence on cars, trucks and planes by subsidising public transport and freight rail,
9. Introduce natural gas as a transitional fuel to phase out coal-fired power stations and coal mines,
10. Assist those individuals most affected by the transition to a low-emission economy,
11. Encourage the transition to low-emission food production and distribution systems.

### **PROPOSED ACTION:**

- 1 Write to all current members of the Federal House of Representatives and Senate, urging that they consider the above NCC recommendation for limiting the adverse environmental effects of man-made climate change.
- 2 Seek Deputations to key Members and Senators to discuss the NCC Recommendations.
- 3 Urge kindred environmental organisations to do the same.

## Wilderness

Submitted by the Colong Foundation for Wilderness.

### 1. Resolution to the legal impediments to wilderness

#### **MOTION**

This conference calls for the removal of the legal impediments to wilderness processes on non-commercial Crown-timbered lands by:

- a) Ensuring any wilderness assessments or identified wilderness land within the Integrated Forestry Operations Approval areas are legally valid;
- b) Amendment of s39 of the Forestry and National Parks Estate Act, 1998 so that it is transparently clear this provision applies only to FMZ 4 (commercial forests) areas in the State Forest estate and not to non-commercial Crown-timber lands, in keeping with the manner in which this Act was originally put into effect;
- c) Similarly amend the Community Conservation Area Act, 2005 so that the Pilliga, Bebo and Mt Kaputar wilderness areas can be formally assessed and protected under the Wilderness Act, 1987.

## Water (1)

Submitted by the Blue Mountains Conservation Society

### **MOTION**

That the Nature Conservation Council of NSW urges the NSW Government to:

- (a) plan for and adequately resource an ecologically sustainable supply of water of both quality and quantity sufficient to meet the identified needs of the growing metropolitan population of the Greater Sydney Region and all aspects of the encompassing environment; and
- (b) Introduce a long-term (e.g. 50-year) metropolitan water plan and commit to ensuring its rolling short-term (e.g. 5-year) plans are consistent with the long-term plan's objectives and strategies.**

### PROPOSED ACTION

Pass the motion unanimously.

Arrange meetings with the pertinent ministers and their departments to press the need for long-term planning, and the need to fully factor in climate change and population expectations.

Meet with all political parties to gain cross-party support for true long-term planning and commitment to an environmentally sustainable water supply that is not predicated upon a substantial 'single-use-throw-away' philosophy.

### **MOTION**

That the Nature Conservation Council of NSW urges the NSW Government, as part of any long-term planning, to commence education of the community, and especially schoolchildren, on the facts underlying the safety of potable recycling, and the preconditions required for safety, with a view to reducing irrational resistance to that concept when it becomes necessary or desirable to introduce it.

### **RATIONALE**

'Indirect potable recycling' or 'drinking water recycling' involves treating wastewater to high quality drinking water standard, mixing the product with catchment water and distributing through existing supply networks.

The MWP dismissed this option in the 2006 MWP because: "The Government does not support introducing recycled water into Sydney's drinking water supply at this time for several reasons. The independent expert analysis of the supply and demand balance shows that Sydney's water supplies are more than adequate to meet the demands of a growing population to at least 2015". "Implications for public health of such a scheme would need to be assessed. For example such a scheme would need to consider the quality of recycled water, dilution levels as the recycled water is mixed into the raw water in storages and the presence of harmful micro-organisms or chemicals". "Further, no such scheme could proceed without community acceptance. Local research shows community reluctance to accept the introduction of recycled water into the drinking water system at present"<sup>1</sup>.

The Government's "reasoning" is disingenuous. The facts are well documented and were known to the planners. It is technically feasible to treat water that would otherwise be discharged from a sewerage treatment plant, raise it to better than present drinking water quality, and then recycle it. This has been practised since about 1968 and is routine in extensively studied places such as Orange County, California and Singapore. In the last 20 to 25 years the technology available enables the quality of the product to compete with the purist forms of water available and far exceed tap water (see Table 4). As Darryl Day, President of the Australian Water Association said "Technology is no longer a barrier for indirect potable reuse; it is now community acceptance"<sup>2</sup>. In fact the desalination plant now being constructed would be capable of this use when not required for emergency seawater desalination and could provide re-cycled water at much lower electricity cost than desalination requires. BMCS considers that perceptions of community reluctance are overstated. However, to the extent that such perceptions are held, they can be shown to be false and Leadership is required to educate the public to the realities so that misconceptions will not be a barrier to future introduction.
